

Message from Rev. Nakata

Connecting with our Sangha with the core teachings of Jodo Shinshu



Hello to all Central California Nishi Hongwanji Sangha friends! In my last article, I wrote "Summer has finally arrived to the Central Valley with 90 plus degree weather and it becomes warmer and warmer." But I was not correct! How many of you were surprised to observe the cool/cold Memorial Day weekend? In normal years, the Memorial Day service attendees usually stand under trees to avoid the direct sun, and the excessive heat but this year, it was quite the opposite. At the Washington Colony Cemetery, some were wearing jackets! I should have taken photos of these rare opportunities. I heard some say that next summer will be cooler than the average years, so I hope we can observe 2024 Memorial Day Services with cool breeze.

In this article, I would like to write about our Central Cal Ministerial Assistant Program (aka CCMAP). After I moved to CC, I hosted the CC Buddhist Education orientation for Sangha members in Sep 2019 and CCMAP orientation in 2020 to standardize the program for active MAs and Prospective MA candidates. The CCMAP orientation was not an easy project because there was no documentation describing what CCMAP is. I spent several hours with Rinban Nakagawa to publish a standardized handout which included the requirements of and the mission of CCMAP. The handout was distributed at the 2020 orientation.

In 2020, I knew that the California State Law AB506 was coming soon, so I added a "background check" as one of requirements because our MAs may be involved with youth activities. As you may know, many youth organizations such as Dharma School, scouts and summer camps require background checks to participate in these activities as adult volunteers.

CCMAP and CCBEC (CC Buddhist Education Committee) jointly has provided 5 Buddhist seminars every year since 2020. We have invited Rev. Dr. Mutsumi Wondra, a faculty member at IBS (Institute of Buddhist Studies) and serves Orange County Buddhist Temple to speak. She holds PH.D. in Jodo Shinshu so she is a most appropriate instructor. We have also invited Bishop Aoki of Canadian Jodo Shinshu, Bishop Matsumoto of Hawaiian Jodo Shinshu, and various other Rinban(s) over the last two years. We have two

more upcoming seminars this year. One of the seminars is hosted by Rev. Rajan Hayashi who is a Nisei (2nd gen) minister from the Mountain State. He was born in Hawaii and served a temple in Virginia. I hope you can attend the seminar.

Rinban Nakagawa, Rev. Midori and I all provide CCMAP classes for adults. I provide two different classes each semester. One class, "Buddhism 101 (Intro to Buddhism)" has over 40 students signed up to learn about Buddhism. I also provide classes for youth, 2nd grade to 12th grade. A youth Ministerial Assistant class runs every two years for 74-hour credit course. Four high school students completed the class and assist in conducting Sunday services by leading chanting, striking the Kansho or leading readings. This class made a significant impact on these students, so I hope more and more students will think about joining these classes.

I try to do my best for you to gain knowledge of and practice Jodo Shinshu teachings. Shinran Shonin handed down these teachings to our ancestors and our ancestors preserved and maintained them for us.

The core teachings of Jodo Shinshu are inclusiveness, harmony, respect, and humbleness.

I work hard for Sangha because I sincerely hope that many people are touched by these wonderful teachings.

Message from Rev. Nakagawa

I, Shinran, have never even once uttered the Nembutsu for the sake of my father and mother. The reason is that all beings have

been fathers and mothers, brothers and sisters, in the timeless process of birth-and-death since the birth of this universe. When I attain Buddhahood, each and every one will be saved without exception. If it could be accomplished by my own powers, then I could transfer the accumulated merits of my Nembutsu to save my father and mother. But since this is not the case, when we become free from selfpower and quickly attain enlightenment, we will save those bound closest to us, no matter how deeply they are immersed in karmic suffering. (TANNISHO, chapter 5)

Obon is the most familiar of festivals celebrated by Buddhists. It is a dharma-gathering where we renew our thoughts about our ancestors by remembering our close relatives who have passed away.

Obon is properly called "Urabanna." Some of you probably know that the word "Ura" means "to be hanged upside down." Let's take a look at some of the causes which we have fallen into difficulties:

- 1. We neglect what is important and value what is not important.
- 2. We put off things that need to be done and hurry to do things that don't need to be done.
- 3. Forgetting things that need to be remembered and remembering things that should be forgotten.
- 4. Asking questions that don't need to be asked instead of asking questions that need to be asked.
- 5. I don't do what I have to do, but I try to do what I shouldn't do.

The list goes on and on. Even if you don't have a specific reason, I'm sure you can think of one.

Our suffering stems from the above-mentioned upsidedown way of being. We think we are standing on our feet, but we are standing on our head in reality, so we can never get rid of our suffering.

If we just live a busy, busy life, we will never realize that we are standing on our head. Standing on one's head is unnatural, so it is several times more painful than standing correctly. As a result, we naturally complain more than those who are standing correctly.

Running around on your head during the hot summer will only make you more frustrated. Therefore, I suggest that

you slow down for a couple of days at Obon and check your way of being, which is the meaning of "Ura," or "I am standing on my head, aren't I?" So, how can we check ourselves if we don't even realize that we are standing on our head? The only way is to be exposed to the correct teachings by Buddha's wisdom. It is only when we are exposed to the right teachings that we realize how upside down we are.

"Bonn" is a vessel. It means a vessel to scoop up the suffering, which means salvation.

Therefore, the "Urabanna" is a gathering where those who are standing on their heads and suffering can be saved through the correct teachings. It is exactly not an event for the dead but for the living who are suffering from standing on their heads.

During the Obon season, we visit graves and read sutras in front of the family tomb stone, so it is often perceived as a Buddhist event for the dead. However, both visiting graves and reading sutras are opportunities for us who are still alive to think about the way we are today, while paying respect to our ancestors.

Those who think that visiting graves and reciting sutras are only for the dead will be surprised when they encounter the words of Tannisho: "I, Shinran, have never even once uttered the Nembutsu for the sake of my father and mother." However, this is the original way of Buddhism.

There is no such thing in Buddhism as a way of thinking for the dead without considering one's own state as a living person.

When we say that we do not recite the Nenbutsu or read the sutras for the dead, it may sound like we are mistreating our ancestors, but in reality, the act of reciting the Nenbutsu or reading the sutras for the dead is mistreating our ancestors.

One should know the reason for this is that in the act of reciting sutras for the dead, there is an unconscious prayer that the dead will go to a better place. The reason we pray for them to go to a better place is because we believe that our ancestors did not go to a better place. The belief that our ancestors did not go to a better place is the reason why we pray for them in the form of Nenbutsu and sutra reading.

We should remember our ancestors who headed towards the Pureland moment under the light of Buddha's wisdom who kept sending, "Namu Amitabha, we will celebrate the Urabanna." I would like to welcome the Obon Festival with great care this year as well.
