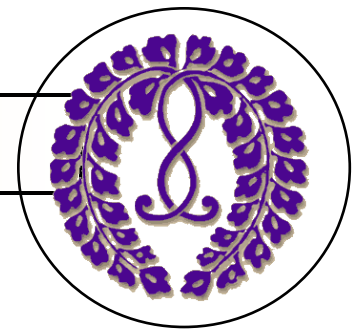

## Message from Rev. Majima

### Do You Know About Peace Day in Hawaii?



In Japan, while peace memorial events are held in Hiroshima every August, every year on September 21st, the State of Hawaii observes “Peace Day,” a day dedicated to promoting nonviolence, compassion, and the importance of education. While this date coincides with the United Nations’ International Day of Peace, Hawaii’s Peace Day has a uniquely Buddhist origin.

Its beginnings trace back to the early 2000s, when young members of the Honpa Hongwanji Mission of Hawaii began taking action. Reflecting on peace and social justice, these youth were deeply influenced by Shin Buddhist teachings—such as interdependence, compassion, and non-harming. For them, peace was not just a political slogan, but something nurtured through daily actions and the attitude of one’s heart.

In 2007, with support from ministers, teachers, and temple leaders, they submitted a resolution to the Hawaii State Legislature to formally establish Peace Day. That same year, the Legislature passed the resolution, and Hawaii became the first state in the United States to officially recognize Peace Day statewide.

This was not merely a symbolic gesture. It was a real-life application of the Dharma in the public sphere. In today’s world—so often dominated by news of violence and division—Hawaii’s Peace Day reminds us of a central Buddhist truth: true peace begins from within. To choose peace means not choosing the path of anger or retaliation. In even the smallest moments, we can choose kindness and calm. And when we say “*Namo Amida Butsu*,” peace has already begun in that very moment.

The young people who helped make Peace Day a reality embodied this truth. They did not wait until they had more age, status, or power. Instead, they acted quietly but firmly, guided by the Dharma, the support of their sangha, and their own inner sense of responsibility.

Today, temples observe Peace Day through services and Dharma messages, and schools hold activities such as peace banners, essays, and projects. A new generation of Buddhists continues to lead the way, spreading the meaning of peace through cultural events and interfaith gatherings.

Hawaii’s Peace Day teaches us that when young people live out their belief in peace and compassion, they can help transform society. Buddhist practice is not confined to temple halls—it can reach the legislature, the classroom, and the neighborhood.

### (Message for students) Do You Know a Girl Named Sadako?

It is August again.

Every year, when this month comes, I quietly put my hands together and think about peace—and about a little girl named **Sadako Sasaki**, who died too young.



There is a statue in the Hiroshima Peace Memorial Park in Japan. It shows a young girl holding a paper crane high above her head.

That girl was Sadako. She was only 2 years old when the atomic bomb was dropped on Hiroshima in 1945. At first, she seemed healthy. But ten years later, she became sick with leukemia, a kind of cancer.

While she was in the hospital, Sadako started folding paper cranes.

There is a Japanese saying:

**“If you fold 1,000 cranes, your wish will come true.”**

Sadako folded many, many cranes with a wish in her heart. She wanted to get better and go home to be with her family again. And more than anything, **she hoped for a peaceful world.**

Sadako passed away when she was just 12 years old. But her story touched many hearts.

People around the world began folding cranes, too. That is why the statue was built—to remember her wish for peace. Near the statue, there is also a **Peace Bell**.

Anyone can ring it. When the bell rings, its sound spreads gently across the park, like a prayer for peace. The bell has pictures of the Earth, paper cranes, and the Atomic Bomb Dome carved into it.

We ring a bell in Buddhism when we make a wish or promise something important. The sound clears our mind and helps us feel peaceful.

During Obon, many families go to the temple. They clean their home altars, visit graves, offer flowers or incense, and say *Namo Amida Butsu*. When we say *Namo Amida Butsu*,

we are remembering that we are loved, supported, and never alone. It is also a way of saying “thank you” from deep inside our hearts.

Obon is not a spooky holiday. It is a peaceful and warm time. It reminds us to appreciate the life we have and to be kind to others. Even something simple—like saying “thank you,” offering a flower, or saying *Namo Amida Butsu*—can help us feel connected to the people who came before us and to everyone around us today.

So next time you say “Itadakimasu” or *Namo Amida Butsu*, remember:

**You are never alone. You are part of a big family of life.**

## Message from Rev. Majima

### 原爆の子の像をご存じですか？

みなさまは、広島<sup>ひろしま</sup>の平和記念公園<sup>へいわきねんこうえん</sup>にある「原爆<sup>げんぱく</sup>の子<sup>こ</sup>の像<sup>ぞう</sup>」をご存<sup>ぞん</sup>じでしょうか。

両手<sup>りょうて</sup>を空<sup>そら</sup>に伸ばし、折り鶴<sup>おりづる</sup>を掲<sup>かか</sup>げる少女<sup>しょうじょ</sup>の像<sup>ぞう</sup>です。あの少女<sup>しょうじょ</sup>は、佐々木<sup>ささき</sup>禎子<sup>さだこ</sup>さんという、実在<sup>じつざい</sup>した少女<sup>しょうじょ</sup>がモデルです。禎子<sup>さだこ</sup>さんは、2歳<sup>さい</sup>のときに広島<sup>ひろしま</sup>で原爆<sup>げんぱく</sup>に遭<sup>あ</sup>いました。そのときは元氣<sup>げんき</sup>でしたが、10年<sup>じゅうねん</sup>後<sup>ご</sup>、白血病<sup>はっけつびょう</sup>になってしまいます。入院生活<sup>にゅういんせい</sup>の中<sup>なか</sup>で、「千羽鶴<sup>せんばづる</sup>を折<sup>お</sup>れば願<sup>ねが</sup>いがかなう」と聞<sup>き</sup>き、たくさん<sup>たくさん</sup>の鶴<sup>づる</sup>を折<sup>お</sup>り続<sup>つづ</sup>けました。

「また元氣<sup>げんき</sup>になってもう一度<sup>いちど</sup>、家族<sup>かぞく</sup>とくらしませすように」

「戦争<sup>せんそう</sup>のない、平和<sup>へいわ</sup>な世界<sup>せかい</sup>になりますように」

そんな祈<sup>いの</sup>りを込<sup>こ</sup>めながら、小<sup>ちひ</sup>さな手<sup>て</sup>で一羽<sup>いち</sup>一羽<sup>まいち</sup>、折<sup>お</sup>り続<sup>つづ</sup>けたのです。禎子<sup>さだこ</sup>さんは12歳<sup>じふにさい</sup>で亡<sup>な</sup>くなりましたが、その祈<sup>いの</sup>りは多<sup>おほ</sup>くの人の心<sup>こころ</sup>に届<sup>とど</sup>きました。やがて「原爆<sup>げんぱく</sup>の子<sup>こ</sup>の像<sup>ぞう</sup>」が建<sup>た</sup>てられ、いまでも世界<sup>せかい</sup>中<sup>じゅう</sup>から折<sup>お</sup>り鶴<sup>づる</sup>が届<sup>とど</sup>けられています。

この像<sup>ぞう</sup>の近<sup>ちか</sup>くには、「平和<sup>へいわ</sup>の鐘<sup>かね</sup>」もあります。誰<sup>だれ</sup>でもつくことができる鐘<sup>かね</sup>で、平和<sup>へいわ</sup>への思<sup>おも</sup>いをこめて一打<sup>いちだ</sup>すると、静<sup>しず</sup>かな響<sup>ひび</sup>きが世界<sup>せかい</sup>に広<sup>ひろ</sup>がるようです。鐘<sup>かね</sup>の表面<sup>ひょうめん</sup>には、地球<sup>ちきゅう</sup>を包<sup>つつ</sup>みこむように「原爆<sup>げんぱく</sup>ドーム<sup>どーム</sup>」と「鶴<sup>づる</sup>」が刻<sup>きざ</sup>まれています。

仏教<sup>ぶつぎょう</sup>においても、鐘<sup>かね</sup>は大切<sup>たいせつ</sup>な意味<sup>いみ</sup>を持<sup>も</sup>ちます。朝夕<sup>あさゆふ</sup>のおつとめの前<sup>まえ</sup>に鐘<sup>かね</sup>を鳴<sup>な</sup>らすのは、仏<sup>ほとけ</sup>さまに感謝<sup>かんしゃ</sup>の心<sup>こころ</sup>を伝<sup>つた</sup>えるため。そして、すべての命<sup>いのち</sup>に「今<sup>いま</sup>こそ目覚<sup>めざ</sup>めましょう」と呼<sup>よ</sup>びかけするためです。

わたしは戦争<sup>せんそう</sup>を知らない時代<sup>じだい</sup>に生<sup>う</sup>まれましたが、それでも8月<sup>8がつ</sup>になると、自然<sup>しぜん</sup>と胸<sup>むね</sup>が痛<sup>いた</sup>み、平和<sup>へいわ</sup>の尊<sup>とうと</sup>さについて考<sup>かんが</sup>えさせられます。思<sup>おも</sup>い出<sup>だ</sup>すのは、中<sup>ちゅう</sup>学<sup>がく</sup>生<sup>せい</sup>のころ、学<sup>がっこう</sup>校<sup>こう</sup>で千羽鶴<sup>せんばづる</sup>を折<sup>お</sup>り、広島<sup>ひろしま</sup>の学<sup>がっこう</sup>校<sup>こう</sup>へ届<sup>とど</sup>けていたことす。ひと折<sup>お</sup>りひと折<sup>お</sup>りに、子<sup>こ</sup>どもながらに「争<sup>あらそ</sup>いのない世界<sup>せかい</sup>になりますように」と願<sup>ねが</sup>いをこめていました。

禎子<sup>さだこ</sup>さんの祈<sup>いの</sup>り、鐘<sup>かね</sup>の響<sup>ひび</sup>き、そして私<sup>わたし</sup>たちのお念<sup>ねん</sup>仏<sup>ぶつ</sup>—

それはどれも、いのちを大切<sup>たいせつ</sup>にし、争<sup>あらそ</sup>いのない世界<sup>せかい</sup>を願<sup>ねが</sup>う心<sup>こころ</sup>から生<sup>う</sup>まれています。

どうかこの機<sup>き</sup>会<sup>かい</sup>に、戦争<sup>せんそう</sup>で亡<sup>な</sup>くなった方<sup>かた</sup>々<sup>がた</sup>を偲<sup>しの</sup>び、平和<sup>へいわ</sup>を願<sup>ねが</sup>って、静<sup>しず</sup>かに手<sup>て</sup>を合<sup>あ</sup>わせていただければと思<sup>おも</sup>います。そして、阿<sup>あ</sup>弥<sup>み</sup>陀<sup>だ</sup>さまの慈<sup>じ</sup>悲<sup>ひ</sup>に包<sup>つつ</sup>まれて生<sup>う</sup>きることを感謝<sup>かんしゃ</sup>し、

南無阿弥陀仏<sup>なむあみだぶつ</sup>とお称<sup>た</sup>えいたしましょう。

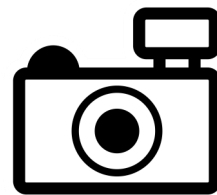
